



Welcome to the January Newsletter. Life in the Library has returned to normal after the Trial exams with break and lunchtimes being very busy!

FEATURED AUTHOR CHRIS BRADFORD

"I write the type of books I'd want to read - books I'd believable characters and a through the pages!"

As an author, Chris Bradford employs a technique he terms 'method-writing'.

For his award-winning Young Samurai series, he trained in iaido (samurai swordmanship), karate, ninjutsu and earned his black belt in Zen Kyu Shin Taijutsu. Previously he has trained in judo, muay thai and kickboxing.

For his BODYGUARD series, Chris embarked on an intensive close protection course to become a qualified professional bodyguard. During his training, he acquired skills in unarmed combat, defensive driving, tactical firearms, threat assessments, surveillance, and even anti-ambush exercises.

And for the Soul trilogy, Chris travelled extensively to experience first-hand the cultures featured in the story — from living with the Shona people in Zimbabwe, to trekking the Inca trail, to meditating in a Buddhist temple amid the mountains of Japan.

His best-selling books are published in over 25 languages and have garnered more than 30 children's book award nominations, winning among others the Northern Ireland Book Award 2011, Hampshire Book Award 2014, the Brilliant Book Award 2014 and the Quick Read 2017. Young Samurai: The Way of the Warrior was deemed one of Puffin's 70 Best Ever Books, alongside Treasure Island and Robin Hood.

Before becoming a full-time author, he was a professional musician (who once performed for HRH Queen Elizabeth II), a songwriter and music teacher. He has written five non-fiction books on music, including the critically acclaimed Heart & Soul (Sanctuary, 2005).

Chris visited our school on the 9th November with his Soul Hunters series presentation. The Year 8 students were mesmerized throughout and many students bought his books which is wonderful to see so many students engage with reading. Thanks to Chris for his inspirational visit.

'THE FINAL GAMBIT' BY JENNIFER LYNN BARNES


