Dear Families,

Well, a whirlwind half term – we packed in so much in the last few weeks. I am definitely ready for the break and I know that our staff and students are as well!

Last week I had the privilege of delivering assemblies across the whole week. Inspired by hearing James Kerr speak at the ASCL Conference, I talked about his book Legacy and the lessons that he had learned about a successful culture from the New Zealand All Blacks. Hopefully the students were as inspired as I was. I wanted to share the video that I showed them of a whole school performing the haka for their teacher who had passed away:





I left them with the thought that we are a family at Thornden – everyone belongs here. Also, remember that our time is short so we need to put everything in perspective and make the most of our time here – what will their legacy be?

We also had some exciting meetings with staff about Artificial Intelligence in school. There is so much potential for AI to improve teaching, learning and the wider administration work that we do at the school. However, we know that we must proceed with caution so we have been using the Ethical Framework for the use AI in Education, developed by Professor Rose Luckin et al. We don't foresee robot teachers any time soon but it certainly has the potential to reduce workload which will free up time for the human elements of our jobs. I even managed to pop in to discuss AI with our Debate Team, who are just putting the final touches on their speech on the subject. What a thoughtful and intelligent bunch! They gave me a lot to think about.

Unfortunately, my own son's parents evening clashed with the Last Dance but I did sneak in to rehearsals on Wednesday night. What a show! I am so sad that I could not attend but many members of staff went to support the team. There is something incredibly special about the Performing Arts at Thornden and the 35-strong boys dance group Pulse do deserve a mention.

The Year 7 Shakespeare Festival was a real feast for the eyes and ears. Our students had worked so hard to put together excellent performances – every single student had learned all of their lines by heart! Thank you to the English team and to our wonderful Year 7s, we are so proud of them.




Creative writing competition

British Science Week-Science Department

8th March 2024 marked the start of the 30th anniversary of British Science Week and Thornden celebrated in style with a week of science activities during the week of 11th March. The theme of this year's Science Week was Smashing Stereotypes with the aim of encouraging students to think of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) careers outside of people wearing white lab coats and staring down microscopes. STEM careers are for everyone, whatever their background!

During the students' Science lessons, they were shown profiles of people with successful STEM careers with backgrounds ranging from a fine jewellery designer moving into protective clothing based on animal scales, to architects moving into producing plant-based foods.





The Science department also put on a range of activities at lunchtimes, centred around the theme of "Time", from designing timepieces to measure time without clocks, to the fastest rollercoasters. Our keenest scientists and engineers set about designing complex rollercoasters in STEM club this week.

By far the most popular activity was our petting zoo where all of the students got the chance to meet Jasmine, Beuno, Fluffy and Iris, the four ducklings that were hatched at school. The annual duckling hatching in the Science Department is popular across the school and is live streamed on a YouTube channel. Staff and students alike can't wait to meet our new arrivals and are always amazed as to how quickly they grow in the space of a week. A year II student said that "the ducklings are definitely a highlight of Science week. I loved watching them swim".

As well as meeting our ducklings, students also get the chance to interact with our Science tortoise, Vernon, and get up close and personal with our Science technician's stick insect collection.

Overall, an exciting week in the Science Department's calendar. We're already planning for next year!

Summer Term

When we return after Easter we will be entering the summer term of sports for PE. This means students will be taking part in a variety of summer sports which may include; athletics, cricket, rounders, tennis, spike ball and softball. Weather dependant, these lessons will be outside. Therefore, in anticipation of the warm weather this term (we can but hope!) I would like to encourage all students to:

- Apply sun cream before PE lessons.
- Bring a water bottle to school which can be filled and taken outside for their PE lessons.
- Bring inhalers, epi-pens or any other medical equipment out with them to their lessons. The majority of students lessons will be on the back fields (a long way from the PE changing rooms).
- In periods of extreme heat (like we had last year) it may be worth bringing a plain sun hat/cap that can be worn as protection from the sun.
- Please can I also remind parents/carers and students of our school uniform policy: https://www.thornden.hants.sch.uk/parents/uniform/.

Students should be in their:

- Royal blue and black panelled polo shirt.
- Royal blue and black panelled shorts or plain black skort.
- Have a change of socks; either plain white or plain black sports socks.

If the weather is cold (as it tends to be at the start of the season), students can opt to wear their:

- Black leggings with school logo (if worn as an alternative to shorts/skorts).
- Reversible royal blue & black rugby shirt.
- Black with white trim tracksuit trousers or their royal blue and black 1/4 zip training top.

The older red PE kit is also still acceptable while we go through this time of transition. However, it is not acceptable to wear form hugging, short shorts such a Nike pros.

As always, all jewellery must be removed, and hair must be tied back for PE lessons; please bring hair bands.

I would also like to take this opportunity to publicly thank Mrs Dudley. Mrs Dudley is moving to work in a school up north (closer to her parents).
