We had a visit from our school improvement partners within HISP Trust last week. They spoke to students, visited lessons and spoke to teachers and leaders about the areas in which we have been improving. Initial feedback has been really positive so we move into the next academic year with a spring in our step and a new development plan to take Thornden from strength to strength.

Last Tuesday the Music department held their Rising Stars concert. Over 50 students from Years 7, 8 and 9 performed to the audience. It was an uplifting event with a huge range of talent on show. Thank you to all of the students that performed and those who came along to support.

During the day Year 10 spent the day at Peter Symonds College in Winchester as they start to think about their next steps after Thornden. They behaved impeccably and engaged with the various sessions and activities that were put on for them. Young people in this area of the world are really spoilt for choice when it comes to colleges and we aim to foster a positive relationship with all providers.

This week has been just as packed. We had our first Parent Forum where we discussed reporting on Tuesday evening. One thing that came up is that parents were not clear that 'Expected Progress' on a students' report is relevant to their prior attainment (in Year 6). This graphic below shows how teachers will look at their average points score that students achieved and use this to decide if students are working to the best of their abilities. Expected progress is to be celebrated! This is where we would expect students to be and it means that they are working well. There will be more changes as a result of the Forum and we will be in touch about future meetings.



St Catherines Hill Trip-Mr Shepherd (Head of Geography)



The Geography department have recently enjoyed a successful round of Year 7 Geographical Enquiry field trips to St Catherine's Hill.

The objective of the trip was for the students to assess the impact of the M3 Motorway cutting through Twyford down on this local Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and the western tip of the South Downs National Park.

Each class spent two hours collecting data aimed at assessing the motorway's impact on this landscape. Pedestrian counts, Environmental Impact Assessment Bipolar surveys were conducted, and field sketches were completed. The students were taught about the environmental and historical significance of St Catherine's Hill, as well as the purpose and benefits of the M3 cutting through Twyford Down.



The students engaged incredibly positively on these field trips, demonstrating the skills required to successfully complete a Geography enquiry. The data the students collected will now need to be presented in graphs back in the classroom. The students will be tasked with analysing their graphs. This analysis will enable the students to reach their own conclusions as to the severity of the impact that the motorway has had on the landscape, but not before evaluating how confident they are in the data collection methods.



This trip is teaching critical data collection skills, graphical analysis, decision making and evaluative skills which is a cornerstone of Geographical thinking. The students represented themselves and Thornden School wonderfully on the trip. It was a lovely half a day out, and one that we hope will form positive and lasting memories for each of our students.



Year 10 Enterprise Day-22nd July

On Monday 22nd July Year 10 students will take part in Thornden's annual Enterprise Day. Enterprise Day is a day full of entrepreneurial activities where students will work together in teams to complete a variety of challenges. Students will be put into a team with other members of their tutor group. Teams will be given a base for the day, the objective for each team is to make as much profit as they can. There will be prizes for the winners and a special assembly on Tuesday 23rd to announce the results.

The reason for an Enterprise Day is to give students a chance to demonstrate skills needed for future employment. Students can demonstrate leadership, teamwork, attention to detail, time management and can show they can communicate effectively with their peers. It also allows students to take risks and be resourceful. All of which are skills needed for post 16 options and beyond.

Year 9 Belong Event-Ms Georgiou (Head of Year 9)



The Year 9 Belong event was a huge success. We were blessed with glorious weather (maybe a few degrees too hot). The students were impeccably behaved and really made us all so proud. Maths Challenge Results-Mrs Davis (Teacher of Maths)



Before half term, we had 102 students taking part in the Junior Maths Challenge from years 7 & 8 with over 80% of students earning themselves either a Bronze, Silver or Gold award – A wonderful percentage!

We had 30 GOLD awards which totals almost 30% of all participants, with the joint top performances from Isabella, Alzbeta and Clara in Year 8 and Martin in Year 7 who came Best in Year for their respective year groups.

A total of 20 students achieved high enough to qualify for the Junior Kangaroo follow-on round.

In addition to all of this we also had a further 24 SILVER and 31 BRONZE awards – Well done everyone! Please see below for a full list of the results.



Miss Bramwell- (Head of History)

We are drawing to the end of a very successful year for our History students at Thornden. Students are almost finishing their summer topics, so please ask them what they have been studying!

Year 7 – What have the Tudors and Stuarts done for us?

Year 8 – How and why do we remember WWI?

Year 9 – How has terrorism shaped our modern world?

Year 10 – Migration and the British Empire 997-2016



As previously included in a newsletter, a major highlight of the year was when Mrs Gemma Heenan led students and staff on a GCSE trip to Berlin, taking in sites such as the Reichstag, Sachsenhausen concentration camp, and the German Resistance Museum.

In recent months Year 8 students have been undertaking a study of WWI based around the key question 'How and why do we remember WWI?'. Student Dougie F has detailed what he has been learning about:



'For this term we have been studying WWI in History. We've explored the causes of conflict, and the trigger event that kicked off the war. Then we moved on to learning about the evolution of weaponry, like poison gas and machine guns. Also, the medical advances including new effective techniques for transportation of blood and the invention of the Thomas Splint. We studied reasons for wanting to go and fight, propaganda and the censorship of soldier's letters. Most recently we had lessons about the Battle of the Somme, and trying to decide whether it was fair to call Field Marshall Haig 'the Butcher of the Somme'.

Students will be finishing the topic looking at the contribution from the soldiers from the British Empire, the Home Front, and reflecting on how we remember by looking at the creation of Remembrance Day, wearing poppies, and the tomb of the unknown soldier.

As part of their home learning, Year 8 students have been planting poppies and researching what happened to local soldiers from Chandler's Ford.

- Year 7 – How did the Anglo Saxons lose control of England?
- Year 8 – How similar were the revolutions in the Early Modern world?
- Year 9 – To what extent was Stalin a 'Red Tsar'?
- Year 10 – Germany 1890-1945
- Year 11 – The Korean and Vietnam Wars

We need your help!-Mrs Kehoe (Assistant Headteacher)



We would really like your help for a new initiative that starts in September. The vast majority of our students have very positive learning behaviours, and we are as close to disruption free learning as we have ever been. However, we do have a small group of students who find that hard.

As a school we hold students to high expectations and do use sanctions when students cross the line – this can range from detentions to fixed term suspensions. Where students have had multiple suspensions, we realise that just putting sanctions in place is not having the desired effect – to improve behaviour and therefore the learning of that small group. We are implementing Restorative Behaviour Days as a way of addressing this situation.

The days will be on Fridays from September and will include a visit to a local care home, an element of physical activity, and some restorative work around student behaviours and choices.

This is where we need your help, please. We have struggled to find a local gym provider/fitness trainer, who would be able to support us with the physical aspect of the day. If you or anybody you know may be able to help with this, please do get in [contact](#) and I will provide further details.
