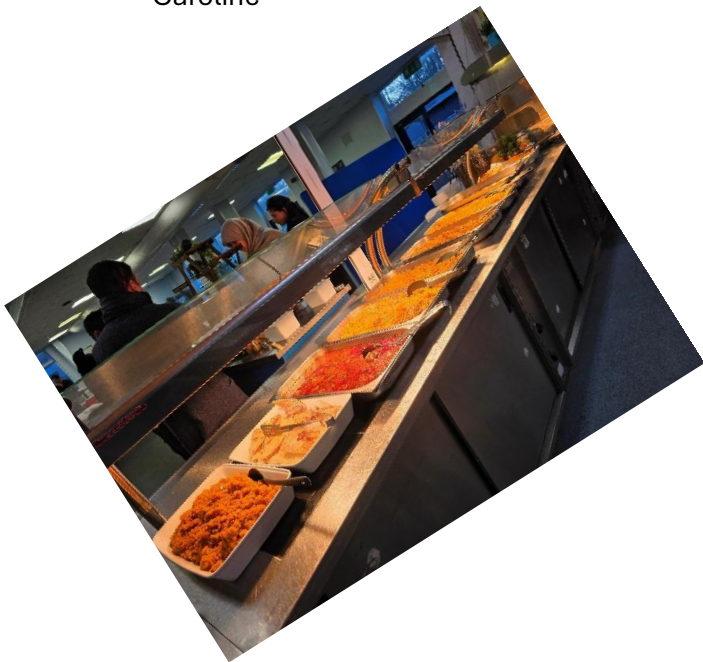
Dear Families,

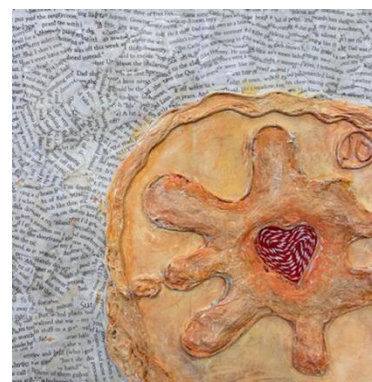

- **Run through typical interview questions** and talk about your own encounters – both good and bad! Learning how to present themselves professionally and keeping a cool head in an interview situation is a valuable skill which will benefit them for the rest of their lives.

- **Attend college/apprenticeship/university open days** to explore what different establishments have to offer. Prospectuses are always available but there's nothing quite like walking around a campus to really get the feel of a place.
- **Get directly involved yourself!** If you are, or work for, an employer who would be willing to support our careers education, please get in touch. Explore Careers in Science and Engineering – Mrs Drabble (Head of Science)

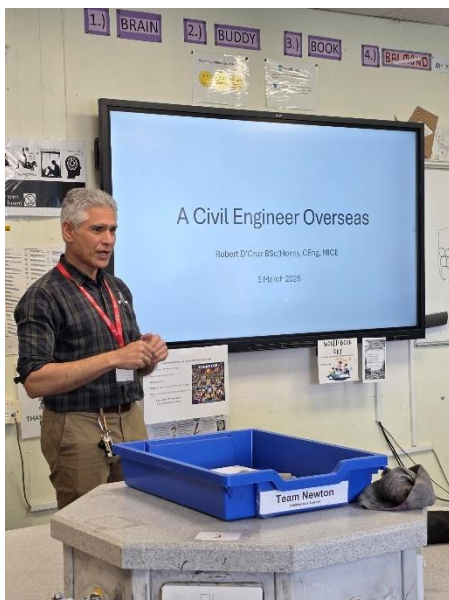
Year 9 students recently took part in a series of STEM careers talks delivered by visiting professionals from a range of scientific and engineering fields.

Students heard from parents working in careers including veterinary nursing, chemical engineering, civil engineering, clinical research, consulting engineering, anaesthetics, biomedical science and infectious diseases. Each visitor spoke about their career journey, what their job involves day to day, and how the subject's students study at school can lead to a wide variety of STEM careers.

The sessions gave students the opportunity to ask questions, learn about different scientific fields, and gain an insight into real world applications of science.

We are very grateful to the parents who generously gave their time to speak with our students and share their experiences.

One student said, "I think that the careers talks were very inspiring and it was nice to see the people talking passionately about their jobs".





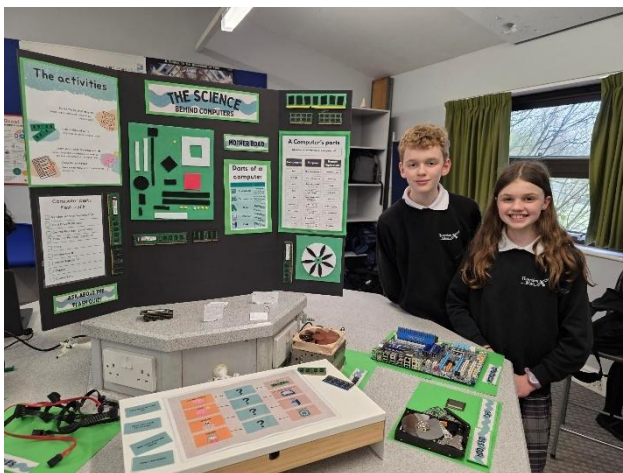
Science Week- Mrs Drabble (Head of Science)

Science Fair

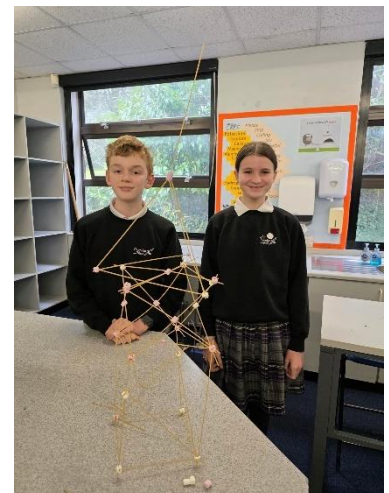

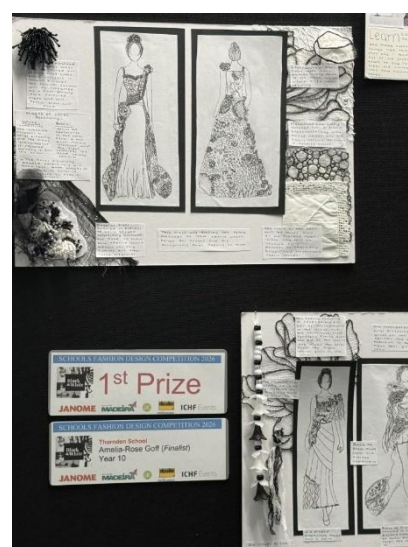
Artemis had the most points from all the tutor groups who took part - well done Artemis house.

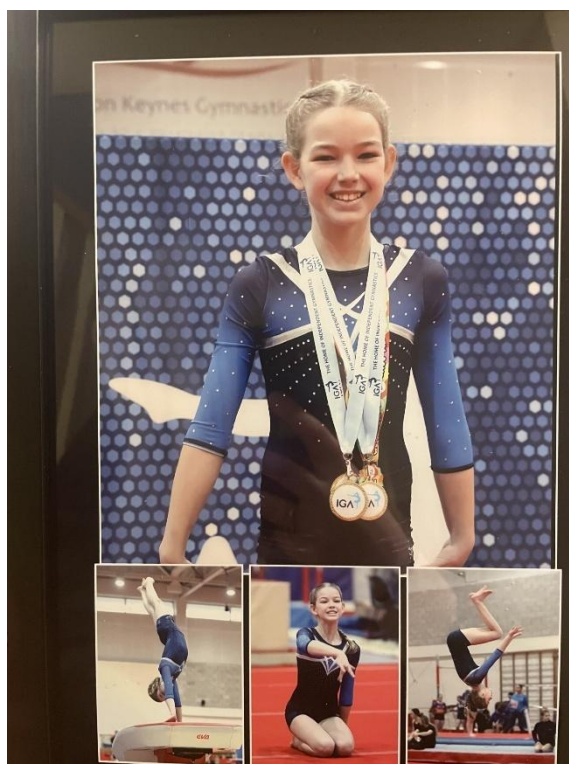
Creative Crafts Show

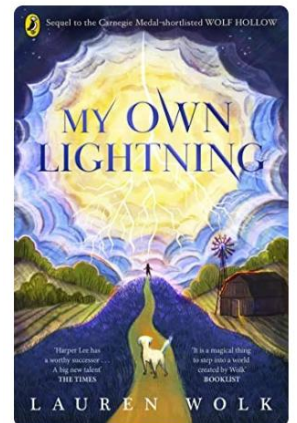
Department Spotlight- Each newsletter we will shine a spotlight on the work of one of our fantastic departments.

Miss Piddington Head of English

At Thornden, we read

We are always keen to find ways to promote reading for pleasure and we often get asked for recommendations of texts from both students and parents. An excellent resource is the website 'School Reading List', which curates children's and YA book lists. All students in Year 7-9 have recently been given printed copies of the recommended reading lists suitable for their age-group. It would be fantastic if you could have a look at the recommendations together and we always love to hear feedback from the students on the books they are choosing to read at home. In Year 8 we are currently reading the novel 'Wolf Hollow' by Lauren Wolk. It is a gripping story about a young girl living in Philadelphia during WW2 who has to navigate the challenges of bullying, friendship and moral courage. This text has been on our curriculum for a number of years now and the students always respond with such insight and enthusiasm. In lessons, students have been focussing particularly on the way the writer chooses to characterise and create character arcs for the protagonists. If your son/daughter enjoyed 'Wolf Hollow', then the English Department highly recommend the sequel 'My Own Lightning', which continues to follow the protagonist Annabelle a couple of years after the events of the first book.



Mrs Oliver and Mrs Russell are leading this year's cohort taking part in the Hampshire Book Awards. Sixteen Year 8 students have begun an exciting journey as part of this annual competition, a programme designed to support the KS3 curriculum while placing oracy at the heart of learning. Over the next three months, students will read four carefully selected books and take part in regular discussions to share their thoughts and ideas. Through this experience, they will build confidence in articulating their opinions, develop a deeper understanding of

texts, and engage in thoughtful, respectful communication with their peers. The programme also provides a valuable opportunity for students to strengthen their speaking and listening skills, fostering a love of reading alongside essential communication abilities.

The team have already begun reading their four books: *The Vulpine* by Polly Crosby, *Westfallen* by Ann Brashares and Ben Brashares, *My Name is Samim* by Fidan Meikle and *Watch Your Back* by Sue Wallman.

The English Department also enjoyed getting into character for World Book Day a couple of weeks ago! We had Violet Beauregarde, Poisedon, Apollo, Artemis and even Little Red Riding Hood and the wolf made an appearance!



Key Focus this term: rehearsing the process

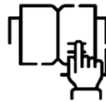
A key strategy that we have been focussing on in our lessons this term has been the concept of 'rehearsing the process'. In English, there are a number of different processes that students need to follow in order to make progress. For example, the process of reading and understanding an unseen text or the process of planning and writing an analytical response.

Research tells us that if we can break down this process for students and rehearse it, they will eventually embed the process as part of their thinking and writing practice. This is a strategy that we have been using a lot with our Year 11 cohort who are now busily preparing for their final GCSEs. For example, in lessons recently we have been rehearsing the process of responding to an unseen poem, which is one of the skills required in their English Literature GCSE.

Here is an example of the process we ask students to follow and a student putting this into practice.

English Literature Paper 2: How to respond to unseen poems

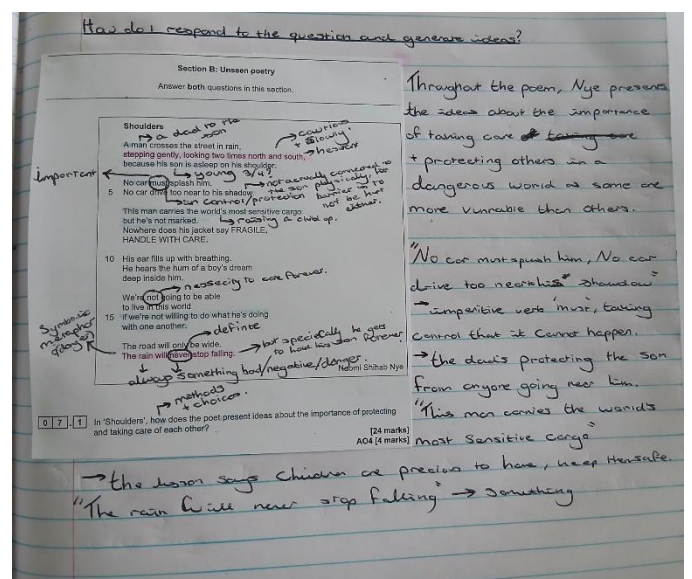
Follow these steps every time you encounter new and unseen poems.



This process is crucial thinking time and will help you to understand the ideas in an unfamiliar poem: it should take you around 10 minutes to read and consider both poems.

Steps: first question - (You will spend 30 minutes answering the question after you have done this preparation.)

1. Carefully read the question and highlight the focus of the question/key theme or idea.
2. Read the poem once.
3. Read the poem a second time: highlight or underline parts of the poem where you can see the key theme/idea explored.
4. Annotate at least three methods you can identify: remember a method is any deliberate choice a writer makes, so the way the poem begins is a method in the same way as a metaphor, for example.
5. Note down two or three ideas/concepts that answer the question.



MFL – Onatti Plays – Mr Tully (2nd in MFL)

Thanks to the ongoing generosity of FOTS and their supporters, we have been able to invite Onatti Productions back to Thornden Hall this academic year to perform plays in French, Spanish and German. All students studying a language in Year 8 or Year 9 have had the opportunity to watch a short performance, allowing them to test and improve their language skills and engage with professional live theatre at the same time. We sincerely look forward to inviting Onatti back to Thornden next year.

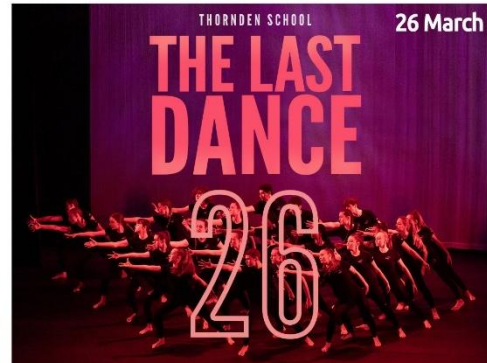

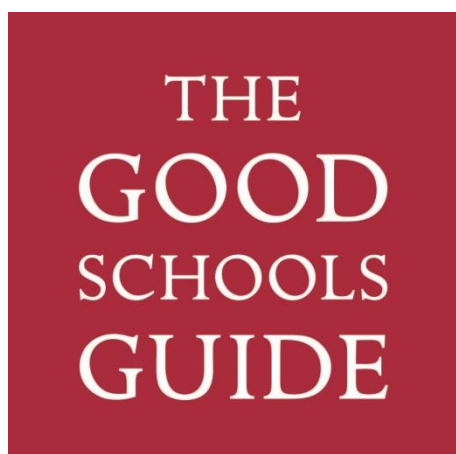
